PETE GALLEGO

Keynote Speaker

Like many American families, Pete's family started out in a small town and through hard work and sacrifice fought its way into the middle class. Pete Gallego's roots in Alpine, Texas go back to the early 1880's. In 1917, his grandparents opened a small family restaurant. That restaurant taught him many lessons, one of the most important being the value of hard work. Pete's dad was a proud WWII veteran who refused any veteran's benefits because he believed his military service was just a matter of meeting his obligation to his country. He worked in his restaurant every day. Pete's mom took a job as a state employee and did everything she could to support three children and help make ends meet.

Pete Gallego graduated from high school in 1980 and from Sul Ross in 1982. Finishing college in two years while balancing three jobs wasn't easy by any means but as Pete has said, "We were raised to be hard workers." After graduation, Pete went on to earn a degree from The University of Texas School of Law.

His first job after graduating from law school was to serve as an assistant attorney general before heading back to Alpine to serve as a local felony prosecutor. It was an excellent job, but he was frustrated to learn that the Texas prison system was too often a revolving door prisoners sometimes serving only one month for each year of their sentence. One day on his drive back home from Huntsville after dropping off a prisoner, Pete received a call from the Upton County Sheriff. Imagine his surprise when he got back to Rankin and found the

prisoner he'd delivered had already been released.

Pete's parents saw firsthand how frustrated he was with the system as it existed and convinced him to pursue change by running for the state legislature. And so he did. Pete was 28 years old when he was elected to the Texas House to represent West Texas.

Two weeks after his first primary win in 1990, Pete married the most beautiful and wonderful woman he ever met, María Elena. They have been married for 24 years and are the proud parents of a ten-year-old son Nicolás.

In the state legislature Representative Gallego was able to get a lot done by sticking to two simple guidelines: (1) always put the needs of the people he represented ahead of any political concerns (or, as Speaker Pete Laney used to say "Vote your district") and (2) always be willing to work with anyone to solve a problem, regardless of party affiliation. Pete used his experience as a prosecutor to write laws to make them tougher on criminals, including passing Texas' "Life Without Parole" law and creating the state's DNA database which helps make sure the guilty are convicted and the innocent are set free. Pete also concentrated on helping victims of crime, including victims of domestic violence. He also proposed legislation to cut taxes for many small businesses in Texas and fought for the natural gas tax exemption, an industry that provides jobs to many families in the district. He worked to increase investments in public education, took on insurance companies on behalf of disabled children and helped build roads, schools and other buildings across southwest Texas. Pete also helped neighborhoods get their first-ever access to water. Pete helped bring about other reforms in our criminal justice system and provided support for Texas veterans. As a son of the border region, Pete knew even in the Legislature that our border was the front door to Texas; so, he worked on strengthening trade, securing our border, and investing in infrastructure.

His days in the Legislature were rewarding. Pete was deeply honored to receive many accolades and awards like being named to Texas Monthly's list of Ten Best Legislators or having an elementary school in Eagle Pass named Pete Gallego Elementary. He loved having the trust and confidence of the people he worked for. At the same time, he was honored to also have the trust and confidence of his peers, both Republicans and Democrats.

Pete's job in the Legislature was to lead people to common ground, to bring people together to reach a good result. However, as he looked at how Congress operated and tried to talk to his own congressman, Pete found himself feeling the same frustration that bothered him as a young prosecutor. He was able to make a difference in Austin. It didn't make sense to him that in D.C., the U.S. Congress could never reach a good result - or any result at all. Pete thought for sure Congress needed a dose of small town values and common sense and felt he could do a better job than some of the people in Washington.

In 2012, Pete made his first run for Congress. It took a lot of help from a lot of people, but by doing what he has always done, working hard and working together, **Pete won!** For someone used to getting things done, Congress was a big change, but Pete refused to give up the work ethic and morals that got him there. In fact, when the government shut down, he immediately sponsored a bill prohibiting Congress from accepting a paycheck because he did not think anyone deserves to get paid when they're not doing their job. With regards to the people who've been in Congress for a while, that didn't make him any new friends.

While in Congress, Pete focused on helping our men and women in uniform and our veterans, as well as our seniors and children. Our country has made commitments to people like his father who served in World War II and who have formed and forged our country. Pete believes that we must keep those commitments to our veterans and our elderly. At the same time, he feels we must be sure to pass on to our children a strong nation full of the same dreams and opportunities our parents provided us.

Today, Pete is a father, husband, son and brother. Family, Pete believes, has made him the man he is, and it's still the most important thing in his life.

SEBASTIÁN MARTÍNEZ Y TREVIÑO

An immigrant to El Paso from Pecos, Texas, Sebastián had been an active Democrat since 1959 when he joined the Texas Western Democrats and participated in the campaign to elect John F. Kennedy. His first voting experience required him to obtain a Poll Tax when he was 21 years old, and that vote was cast by mail since he was a registered voter in Pecos, County of Reeves.

His first taste of the beautiful ambient of the people of El Paso was in the summer of 1956 when the parish of Santa Rosa de Lima in Pecos sent him to do volunteer work for Father Rahm, who was director of Our Lady's Youth Center in South El Paso. That experience always drew him back to El Paso.

His parents, Elígio and Julia Treviño de Martínez, were his early mentors in politics. They helped register people to vote in Pecos. Their success was such that the Republican Party investigated those successful efforts. One of his early El Paso Democratic mentors in the art of grassroots politics was Mrs. Josephina Ramirez, a Democratic dynamo who spearheaded voting in El Paso County. The enthusiasm of working with the people in South El Paso and the Mission Valley, rapt Sebastián to serve as her driver and helper in organizing the elderly for the Democratic Party below the freeway in the effort of 1960. Another mentor was County Judge Woodrow Bean, who showed Sebastián how to sue the County Democratic Chair for not following party rules. Sebastian is a zealous supporter of parliamentary procedures.

- Founding participant of Mobile Early Voting first started in El Paso in 1990.
- First elected Democratic Precinct Chair in 1972: a service of 41 years and still going strong; elected delegate from Precinct, County and State: 1992 Committed Bill Clinton to NYC National Convention.
- Original Founding of redistricting lines for El Paso County, 1978, City of El Paso, El Paso County Community College, and El Paso Independent School District.

Sebastián is most proud of being a contributing member of the Southern Poverty Law Center, (20 Years), and the Martin Luther King Wall of Remembrance. He is an active protestant for Trabajadores sin Fronteras, Cesar Chavez, Dreamers, Occupy El Paso and where he sees discrimination and intolerance.

JOE MOODY

Joe Moody represents Texas's District 78, a mixed urban and rural district covering swaths of northern El Paso County. He is a lifelong El Pasoan and a second-generation public servant. His father, District Judge William Moody, and his mother, El Paso school teacher Magdalena Morales-Moody, taught Joe the value of community service and respect for the laws of Texas. In 2011, Joe was married to Adrianne Riley, and in 2014, they welcomed their first child, William.

Joe returned to the 84th Session of the Texas House of Representatives after serving in the 81st and 83rd Legislatures. During those sessions, Joe served on the Criminal Jurisprudence Committee, the Committee on Border and Intergovernmental Affairs, and the Defense and Veterans Affairs Committee. He was also tapped by the Speaker of the House to work on the Select Committees on Criminal Procedure Reform and Healthcare Education and Training and the Joint Committee on Human Trafficking. His work focused on fighting to ease the burdens on soldiers returning home and on a variety of criminal justice topics, including domestic violence and stalking issues, smart-on-crime initiatives like graffiti diversion, and efficiency measures designed to make the most of our limited criminal justice resources.

During the 84th session, Joe returned to the Criminal Jurisprudence Committee as vice chairman, where he continued to advocate for the rights of crime victims and promote smart criminal justice responses, including major marijuana policy reform. Joe remains one of the most respected voices on criminal justice in the House. He also served on the Homeland Security and Public Safety Committee and the General Investigating and Ethics Committee during this session, and was recently chosen as the vice chairman of the House Select Committee on Mental Health, which is aimed at improving mental health resources and outcomes throughout the state.

At the close of his first session, Joe was awarded Freshman of the Year by two non-partisan groups: the Mexican American Legislative Caucus and the Texas District and County Attorneys Association (TDCAA). His efforts have continued to be recognized by TDCAA, which gave him their Law and Order Award the past two sessions, and by the Combined Law Enforcement Associations of Texas, which named him Representative of the Year last session.

Outside of the Legislature, Joe is an attorney. He served as a prosecutor for many years at the El Paso County District Attorney's Office before entering private practice, where his focus has been probate and estate planning as well as criminal defense. He is a partner at the Law Offices of Neill & Moody, P.C.

JOSE RODRIGUEZ

José Rodríguez was elected in 2010 to represent Texas Senate District 29 (SD 29), which includes the counties of El Paso, Hudspeth, Culberson, Jeff Davis, and Presidio. He represents both urban and rural constituencies and more than 350 miles of the Texas-Mexico border.

Before his election to the Texas Senate, Sen. Rodríguez served as the El Paso County Attorney for 17 years. During his tenure, he established an unparalleled record of achievement, improving public safety, enhancing legal services to protect vulnerable citizens, promoting education, increasing County revenues and funding for jobs and economic development and strengthening community health and environmental quality.

That high level of service to his community continues today as a member of the Texas State Senate. Sen. Rodríguez is a staunch advocate for those in need. He has proven himself an effective voice for SD 29, sponsoring more than 150 bills during his three sessions in the Texas Senate. This includes legislation addressing education, health care, economic development, renewable energy, criminal justice reform, public safety and the courts, ethics and government transparency and veterans. Of note, Sen. Rodríguez sponsored legislation transforming the Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center at El Paso from a branch of the Lubbock—based health sciences center to an independent, standalone university component of the Texas Tech University System. He also drafted a series of bills to address cheating and accountability in standardized testing in our schools.

His hard work and tenacity on the Senate floor have gained him numerous accolades, including being named "Freshman MVP" by *Capitol Inside*, "Legislative Hero" by Texas Access to Justice Foundation, "Best of Senate" by the Combined Law Enforcement Association of Texas, "Advocate of the Year, Elected Official" by the Texas Association for Education of Young Children, "Texas Women's Health Champion" by the American Congress of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, "Champion of Equality" by Equality Texas, "Legislator of the Year" by the Family Law Foundation, "Senate Legislator of the Year" by Texas Nurse Practitioners and the "2015 TABE Joe J. Bernal Community Service Honoree" by the Texas Association for Bilingual Education.

Sen. Rodríguez currently serves as Chairman of the Texas Senate Democratic Caucus (SDC). He is also as a member of the following Senate Committees: Education, Health & Human Services; Nominations; Veteran Affairs & Military Installations;, and Agriculture, Water & Rural Affairs. Before leading the SDC, he served as Chairman of the Texas Senate Hispanic Caucus for nearly two years.

In addition, Sen. Rodríguez serves as one of only five U.S. Presidential appointees on the 10-member Board of Directors of the Border Environment Cooperation Commission—North American Development Bank (BECC—NADB). This Board has distributed \$2.6 billion in loans and grants for over 200 BECC—certified infrastructure projects on both sides of the border.

He is also a long—time member of the Mexican-American Legal Defense and Educational Fund (MALDEF) Board of Directors. He is currently Chairman of the Border Legislative Conference (BLC), which is a joint program of the Council of State Governments (CSG) West and its regional partner in the South, the Southern Legislative Conference (SLC), and comprised of legislators from the 10 American and Mexican states bordering the U.S.—Mexico border.

The son of migrant farm workers, Sen. Rodríguez, was born in Alice, Texas. From an early age, he worked in fields throughout the country to help support a family of nine. The first in his family to attend college, he received his undergraduate degree from Pan American University in 1971 and his law degree from the National Law Center at George Washington University in 1974. Since 1983, Sen. Rodríguez and his family have made their home in El Paso, where they have been deeply involved in civic, economic development, and human rights activities.







Isela Castañon-Williams is a life-long resident of El Paso and proud mother of three sons, Antonio, Isaiah, and Israel Williams. She began her involvement in Democratic political campaigns at the age of thirteen when she campaigned outside

a voting station for a Democratic candidate who was a teacher. Ruth Ybarra Williams is the sixth of ten children born to Gabriel Campos Ybarra and Maria Magdalen Garcia Ybarra. She was born on January 20, 1946, in Odessa, Texas. She graduated from Ector High School and received her Associate of Arts degree from Odessa Junior College. She continued her studies in El Paso, Texas where she received her Bachelor of Arts degree with Teacher's Certification in French and Spanish from the University of Texas at El Paso and an English Teachers' Certification from the University of Texas at Austin. Later, she received her Masters of Education in Mid-Management at the University of Texas at El Paso.

Ruth spent 28 years teaching in grade levels 6th through 12th in public schools in the Austin ISD, El Paso ISD, and Ysleta ISD. She taught English and history for the Big Bend College European Project in Gelnhausen, West Germany for a semester; while in Germany she also took the position of test administrator for the U.S. Government Education Department for two years. She has coached and sponsored student activities such as the Black History Program and the Hispanic History Program.
